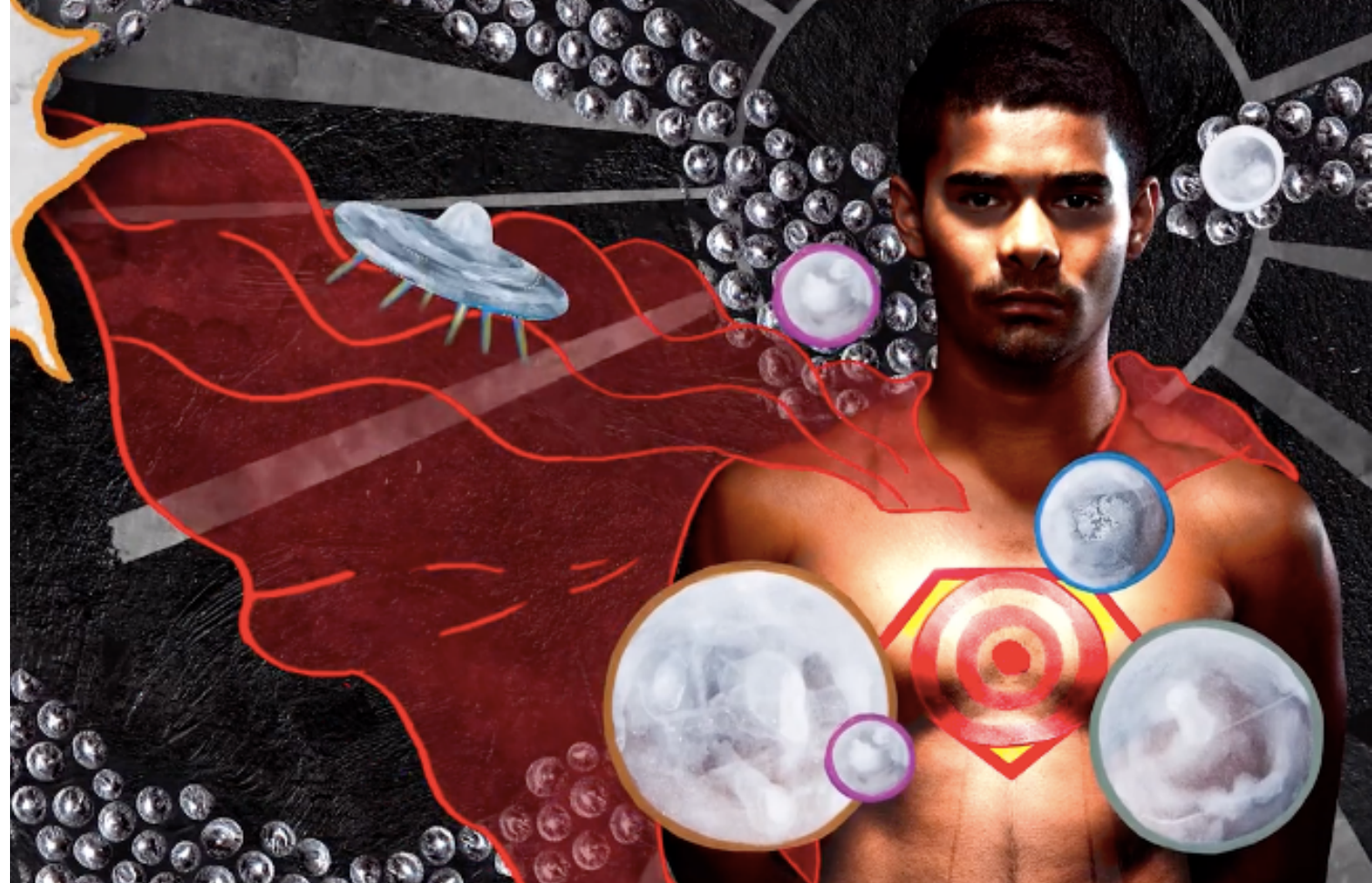

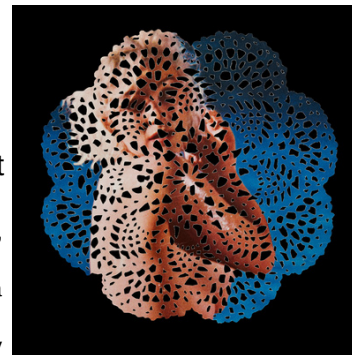

Transference

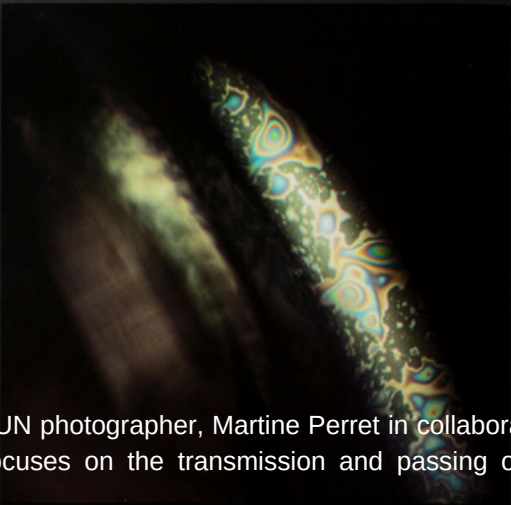
MARTINE PERRET
